Lab News

Last month Dr. Vieira traveled over 4,000 miles to Riga Stradina University in Riga, Latvia to present a lecture titled "The Many Faces and Facts of Oral Clefts". This trip was the result of many e-mail exchanges between Dr. Vieira and Dr. Baiba Lace, the head of the Department of Human Genetics . Dr. Lace originally contacted Dr. Vieira requesting advice for problems with her experiments. Eventually she invite him to Riga to discuss possible research collaborations and to present a lecture. While in Riga, Dr. Vieira toured the research facilities, met with other faculty and students, and discussed in detail their collaborations dealing with the genetics of cleft lip and palate and its association with cancer.

The trip was very successful; in fact two of Dr. Lace's students are interested in coming to the Vieira laboratory to conduct more research. Dr. Vieira was pleasantly surprised at the warm reception he received while in Riga and at the research being conducted by Dr. Lace. He is confident the collaboration will yield productive results.

Although Dr. Vieira was far away from home and even further away from his native Brazil, he felt a familiar connection to Riga. One of Brazil's favorite drinks, caipirinha, (a drink made from cachaça ((distilled sugar cane)) was extremely popular in Riga. This made the 4,000 mile distance seem much closer than he previously thought.

Dental Registry and DNA Repository News

The Dental Registry and DNA Repository submitted its very first IRB (Institutional Review Board) Continuing Review last month on May 9^{th} and recently received its final approval on June 15. There are several exciting key changes made to the study protocol.

The inclusion criteria will be expanding so that the previous age limit of 85 years old for subjects will no longer exist. In addition, individuals who speak Spanish, Portuguese, Chinese or Korean (but not English), will be able to participate, as the consent forms will be available in these four languages. Turkish and Russian translations are also in the works for a future date.

Brief anonymous surveys will be used to question patients who decline to participate in the study, which will create a better understanding of why individuals decide not to partake in research studies. Analyzing the compilation of these responses may possibly lead to its own study a future date. Another area in which the DRDR project is currently expanding this summer pertains to the study database.

The DRDR currently has 463 participants to date and only 66 declines, keeping the very steady and positive compliance rate of 85%.
